No.Ft.29-24/B/B 49.In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 29 of the Govt of Indian Forest Act (XVI of 1927) as applied to H.P. read with the Govt. of India, Ministry of State Notification No.146 dated 6th Dec.,1950, the Chief Commissioner, H.P is pleased to declare the provision of Chapter IV and that Act applicable to all Forest lands or wastelands in H.P. which are the property of Govt. or over which the Govt. have proprietary rights or to the whole or any part of the produce of which the Govt. is entitled as recorded in the forest Settlements or land revenue Settlements of land revenue records of the integrated states, otherwise except to the following areas:-

APPENDIX-I (IV)

GOVERNMENT OF HIMACHAL PRADESH FOREST DEPARTMENT NOTIFICATION

No.Ft.43-241/A/49-3. In exercise of the powers conferred by section 30 of the Indian Forest Act (XVI of 1927) as applied to H.P. read with the Govt. of India, Ministry of State Notification No.146-J dated the 6th Dec.1950, the Chief Commissioner H.P is pleased to make the following rules for such areas in the old Kumarsain, Khaneti, Sangri, Darkoti, Theog, Ghund, Balsan, Madhan, Keonthal, Koti, Ratesh and Bhajji States including the Pepsu enclaves which have been declared as protected forests in Himachal Pradesh Government Notification No. 29-241-BB/49 dated the 25th February,1952.

Rules

1. In these rules, unless there is something repugnant in the subject or context:-

"First Class Protected Forests" means the demarcated forests detailed in Schedule I of this Notification. "Second class protected forests" means the (a) undemarcated forests (b) uncultivable wastelands with or without trees (c) all ghasanies and banis in the possession of Zamindars and Lanas near habitation, which are the property of Government and not assessed to land revenue.

"Divisional Forest Officer" means the officer for the time being incharge of the lower Bushar or Shimla Forest Division as the case maybe."Record of rights means the record approved by Superintendent, Hill States, Shimla in respect of the various states named above.

"Right-holders" means a land holder, whether as owner, cultivator of mortgago who settled or may settle in further in the territories of the above, states.

"Trees and timber" shall have to the same meaning as defined in the Indian Forest Act (XVI or 1927).

"Cattle" means cow, bullocks, sheep and goats, ponies and mules but not, buffaloes, elephants, camels and pigs." "Right Holders right admitted in the record of rights.

2. Except where the contrary is stated, the rules apply to the protected forests of all classes.
3. The exercise of rights in restricted to the bonafide produce obtained in the exercise of right shall not be bartered, sold or given as a gift or in any other way disposed of by right holders.

4. Grant of trees required for building construction by right holders will be subject to the following conditions:
 - a) Trees shall be marked by the Forest Department for following only on payment of fees to be fixed from time to time.
 - b) A right holder will apply to the Divisional Forest Officer for the grant of trees when a new house is to be built or an old one is to be repaired.
 - c) The assessment of number of trees to be granted will be based on the sale condition that house to be constructed and repaired conforms to be the usual pattern of building which right holders generally use for their residence in the locality concerned. No trees will be granted for building to be given on rent or to be used as a shop.
 - d) The tree granted shall be used only for the purpose for which they are granted and no timber or tree acquired by right holders in the exercise of their rights may be sold, bated or in any way alienated.
 - e) Saw and not axe would be used by the right holders for splitting the tree into planks and scantlings.
 - f) The period of felling of trees and removal of timber shall be three months. It may be extended to six months on payment of one-fourth of the original fee.
 - g) Trees will not be ordinarily be granted more often than once in five years to any right holders but in case of accidental burning of the applicant's house to meet the actual requirement of a right holder.
 - h) The building shall be constructed within the limits of the village where the cultivated land on account of which the trees are given is isolated unless the contrary has been specially allowed.
 - i) If trees are not available in the II class protected forests these are given first from there otherwise from the first class protected forests.
 - j) Unmarked trees of all species except Deodar, Kail, Chil, Rai, Oak and Walnut may be cut free by right holders under a written permits for the following purpose: (a) Fuel for marriage (b) Fuel for funeral ceremonies and (c) for making agricultural and domestic implements.
 - k) Right holders may cut crooked and unsound tree of inferior class where these are not available for burning the dead without permission provided intimation is given to the local forest guard within one week of such felling. Felling Deodar trees for burning the dead is prohibited.
5. Trees required by the custodians of village temple shall be marked by the Forest Department if forest owns the temple and, if no trees are available there from the second class protected forest and if no trees are available there then

from the first class protected forests according to the rights specified in the record of rights.

6. The right holders may fell nirgal and bhashal trees for making kiltas and baskets required for their own domestic and agricultural requirements before as well as after felling.
7. Right holders requiring trees for water mills water courses forked wood for oil mills will apply for the grant and on the application being sanctioned Kail or Chil shall be granted free of charge, if available.
8. Right holders may lop Oak and other broad leaved trees for marking Nal, Halish, Sohaga and Shamains etc. In case they cut trees for this purpose intimation must be given to the local forest guard within seven days for their having done so.
9. Right holder may be granted Oak, Kail or Chil trees on payment of prescribed fees for conversion into charcoal required for the preparation and repairing of agricultural implements. In first class protected forests, Divisional Forest Officer, may allow lopping of big kail trees free of burning into charcoal.
10. Burning charcoal in the first class protected forest is prohibited except in the nalas, khada and under such conditions as the Divisional Forest Officer may impose.
11. Right holders may graze such cows and bullocks as are required by them for domestic and agricultural needs in the I and II class protected forests, except Moharanal Forest of Bhajji Range.
12.
 - a) Grazing of sheep and goats in 'Shal'(flocks) are prohibited in first class protected forests.
 - b) Grazing of sheep and goats in; toli' is prohibited except in the fir forests.
13. Grazing of buffaloes is prohibited in Deodar and Kail forests except for the limited number (to be specified by the Government from time to time).
14. Non agricultural residents may also graze cattle in the second class protected forests on payment of prescribed fees provided that no right is thereby conferred and that the concession may be revoked any time.
15. Right holders shall not sell or lease their rights of grazing in the forest nor will give permission to other to graze.
16. (I) No land shall be broken up or cleared for cultivation or any other purposes in the 2nd class protected forest.

(II) No land shall be broken up or cleared for cultivation or any other purposes in the 2nd class protected forest except with the permission in writing of the Dupty Commissioner of the District.

17. Removal of bark from green trees is prohibited.
18. Girdling and tapping of trees and cutting of torch wood from deodar and other trees is prohibited.
19. (a) Oak and broad leaved species above 1 feet in girth may be lopped provided the upper one third of the crown is not touched.
(b) Rai trees (spruce and fir) over one and a half foot in girth may be lopped provided upper half of the crown is left untorched.
20. The right holders may cut, collect and remove the following for the purpose of domestic and agricultural requirements without obtaining any permits.
 - a) All dry fallen trees except Deodar, Walnut, Shisham and Kail over 2 feet in girth.
 - b) Branches of all dry and fallen trees.
 - c) Stumps of felled trees provided the hammer mark on the stumps is left intact.
 - d) Refuse from fellings.
 - e) Brushwood.
 - f) Such trees as may be marked for the purposes by the forest department.
 - g) Stones and slates from second class protected forest for their own domestic and agricultural requirements. Starting of new quarries without permission is prohibited.
 - h) Earth for plastering and marking pots.
 - i) Grass for domestic cattle as specified in the records of rights.
21. Construction of water courses in the first and second class protected forests is prohibited except with the permission of Government.
22. Burning ghats admitted in the settlement will be permitted to be used as such.
23. Subject to such restrictions (including complete stoppage) as the Government may impose to the right holders and other may exercise the previlages.
 - a) Collection of small quantities of violet flowers in the hot and rainy season and collection of mushroom and edible medicinal roots in

summer, and collection of walnut and sharoli in autumn and sale of any these provided the sales do not take the nature of trade.

- b) Removal by the shoe- makers of bark from fallen trees and wood from the Deodar stumps (of fallen trees) leaving the hammer marks intact.
 - c) Removal of new leaves.
 - d) Extraction of Deodar oil from chips or wood from its stumps and roots or marking of kiln for the purpose in 1st, class protected forests may permit its construction in IInd class protected forests on payment of fees prescribed by Government.
24. Grazing by nomadic Gujjars is prohibited except to the extent allowed by Government on specified conditions and regulations and on payment of such fees as money is prescribed.
25. The following rules are not only applicable to the IInd class protected forests:-
- a) The trees are divided into two categories as under:-

Trees of the Ist category, Deodar, Kail, Chil, Rai, Pindari, Ban, Mohru, Akhrot, Shisham, Tun, Kakar, Siris, Shamsad, Kahu, and Khair. Trees of the second category: Khark, Dewal, Drek, Karol, Chulti, Challan, Kanish, Kainth, Figseres, Bares, Bechas, Tyaamal, Umar, Nirgal.
 - b) The zamindars may lop all trees of the first and second categories except, Deodar, Shisham and Tun, provided that the lopping is confined to the lower middle part of the crown. In the case of Ban, Mohru and Kharsu the lopping may extend to the top of the trees.
 - c) When there are not kail trees available near the cremation grounds, the zamindars may cut deodar trees upto 3 feet in girth for burning the dead.
 - d) Cutting of grass from the ghasnis is prohibited except by those who are in recorded possession of them. Likewise lopping of Mohru and Ban in lands near habitation is prohibited except by those who are in possession of them.

APPENDIX-II (i)

RECORD OF RIGHT OF BHAJJI STATE

1. Rights and concessions:

The following three kinds of Forests exist in the State:

- i) Reserved forests (mahfuja): These are the absolute property of the state where no rights are admitted.
- ii) Demarcated forests (mahduda): In these forests rights have been admitted for each forests according to the Records of Rights of 1906-07, but no rights can be exercised in them if there is a dehat forests which can satisfy these rights in reasonably convenient locality. No land can be broken for cultivation or given for 'Ghasni in these forests.
- iii) Dehat Forests: They comprise of village Jungles, Charand Darakhtan (grazing land containing tree growth) and Charand Bila Dharakhatan (grazing lands devoid of tree growth). These areas are not demarcated but otherwise the zamindars have same rights in them as in the demarcated forests except that no land can be broken for cultivation without the permission of the competent authority.

2. Record of Rights for Demarcated Forests

General: The rights admitted herein are subject to the following conditions:

- i) Right holders are forbidden to light fire inside or burn any forests. All right holders of the forests and those living nearby are to help in extinguishing fires in the forests. Otherwise all rights of user will be suspended for certain period to be determined by the State.
- ii) If there be trees or wood are either in 'dehat forests' or cultivated lands (i.e. outside the Demarcated Forests) at a reasonable distance, then right holders requirements will be supplied there from, if not, then the demarcated forests.
- iii) The right holders will not sell trees or timber obtained from the forest to anyone, nor will they sell timber from cultivated lands without permission from the state as per established customs.
- iv) Right holders will help to repair boundary pillars and attend to other forest work as in the past.

- v) Right holders will not sell grass or fuel obtained from forests without permission from the State as all rights admitted are for their personal use only.

All the rights will continue to be exercised so long State Zamindars follow the customary aien (Laws) of the State. Failing in this, rights will be withdrawn.

The following are the rights:

- i) Right to water or watering places.
- ii) To remove trees free of charges for agricultural implements with permission of the State.
- iii) To cut trees for charcoal for making and repair of tools with permission of the State.
- iv) Timber for building purposes on permission from and on payment of fees to the State. (If available in the forests).
- v) To remove dead and fallen pieces of wood and cut trees (excepting timber trees) for marriage purposes with permission from the State (free of charge).
- vi) To cut and remove fuel trees for cremation purpose without permission from the State (free of charges), even timber trees can be made use of, if other woods are not available.
- vii) To cut and collect shrubs and thorny bushes and wind fallen trees, not fit for timber, for daily fuel consumption. Lopping of trees (excepting timber) allowed only according to rules. (Viz. up to half the height of the trees and when it is more than 1.5 in girth).
- viii) Grazing of domestic and agricultural cattle, sheep and goats throughout the year, except grasslands when after cutting of grass.
- ix) Grass cutting for domestic purposes.
- x) Lopping of trees for fodder according to rules.
- xi) To remove needles for bedding of cattle and litter.
- xii) Shooting with the permission of State.
- xiii) Cremation grounds.
- xiv) Right of way over existing paths and roads.
- xv) 'Chak' (cultivations included within demarcated forests).
- xvi) Torches with permission from the State but only out of dry and fallen trees.
- xvii) Removal of Nagal, when available and on payment of fees.

APPENDIX-II (ii)

RECORD OF RIGHTS (KOTI STATE) GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Preliminary

1.
 - a) In the record “demarcated forests” means the area specified in the detailed record of rights under heading demarcated forests.
 - b) “Undemarcated forests” means waste forest land except the demarcated forests.
 - c) “Waste forest land” means generally waste land under tree upon which no revenue is assessed but includes:
 - i) Grass land (Ghasani)
 - ii) Land assessed to revenue which, though once cultivated, has land uncultivated for a period not less than 7 years.
 - d) The word “Forests” includes both demarcated and undemarcated forests except where the contrary is expressly stated.
 - e) “Right holders” means any person entitled to any or all of the rights for which provision is made in this record.
 - f) “Tree, Timber, Cattle” have the same meaning as in the Indian Forest Act XVI of 1927.
2. All rights for which Provision is made in the record are rights only of user.
3. Trees growing spontaneously or planted by the State in the forests are the property of the State subject to such rights. The state is entitled to protect, improve and reproduce the Forest growth within the area of the forests.
4. In the forest no land can be partitioned or appropriated for the purpose of cultivation or for making any field (Ghasani), except with the previous sanction of the superintendent, hill states, which may be refused in the interests of the rights of the State, in the trees or other rights (if any which the State may possess).

B. Rights of Right Holders

5. The following are the rights of right holder for exercise of which provision is made in this record.
 - i) To graze their own cattle
 - ii) To obtain trees and timber.
 - a) For agricultural implements and domestic utensils.

- b) For the construction and repair of temples, dwelling houses, cattle sheds, water mills, irrigation pipes and other agricultural buildings.
- c) For fuel for daily use and for marriage and funeral ceremonies.
- d) For cremation of the dead.
- e) For charcoal to be used in the manufacture and repair of agricultural implements.
- iii) To take the following articles of forest produce:
 - a) Grasses of all kinds for fodder and for other purposes.
 - b) Dry wood for fuel.
 - c) Brushwood for fences;
 - d) Side branches of trees for fences, fodder and manure.
 - e) Fallen leaves for manure and other purposes.
 - f) Leaves of trees for tanning;
 - g) Leaves and bark of climber;
 - h) Stumps of trees for torches, fuel and charcoal.
 - i) Bamboos for baskets and other purpose;
 - j) Fruits flowers, medicinal and edible roots and leaves.
 - k) Surface stones and slates for buildings and other purposes.
 - l) Earth for plastering, making vessels, bricks and other purposes;
 - m) Wild honey.
- 6. Persons to whom the soil of any part of a forest is leased or rented and who is neither owner nor occupier of any revenue paying cultivation and to which rights in the forest in question are appendent, may subject to the conditions and limitation herein after prescribed and to any rules which superintendent, hill states, may subsequently issue, exercise in the forest in question the right to collect dry fallen wood fit only for fuel.
- 7. The proprietors and agricultural tenants of cultivated land to which, in the detailed record of any demarcated forest all or any of the rights mentioned in para-5, declared to be appendent may, subject as aforesaid, exercised such rights within the part of that forest specified in the record.
- 8. The proprietors and agricultural tenants of cultivated land in the State may exercise in the undemarcated forests all or any of the rights mentioned in para-5, to which they are now entitled; provided that these rights shall be exercised subject to the limitations and conditions laid down in this record.
- 9. Tenant at will entitled to trees for building or for agricultural purposes under para-7 and 8, shall receive these trees through the proprietors under whom they hold tenancy.

10. With the exception of the rights admitted in para-6 all the rights of right holders are appendent to cultivated land assessed to revenue and to the land which may subsequently be brought under cultivation and assess to revenue with the permission of the Superintendent, hill states, and are acquired and alienated only with such land. They are exercised only for the bonafide agricultural and domestic purpose of the right holders and only in behalf of their own neither cattle nor are they exercised purely pastoral as distinguished from agricultural purposes.
11. Forest produce acquired by right holders in the exercise of their right may not be sold, bartered, or in any way alienated, nor may it be applied to any but the purpose for which it was acquired.
12. Trees for building purposes are not given when the right holders applying for them has already got suitable building in a reasonable convenient locality and of size sufficient for the requirement of a bonafide native agriculturist holding the land to which the right appertains.
13. When trees are given for building purposes the building are constructed within the limits of the village where the cultivated land on account of which the trees are given is situated unless the contrary has been specially allowed.
14. All rights admitted are subject to the limitation that they may not be exercised to an extent that may endanger the existence of the forest over which the rights are admitted.
15. Right holders may graze only their own cattle. They may not lease the grazing in the forests, not take grazing dues, nor allow other than right holders to graze in them.
16.
 - i) Non-agricultural residents may graze their cattle in the undemarcated forests under a licence and pay the prescribed dues provided that no right is thereby conferred and that the concession may be revoked at the pleasure of the Superintendent, hill states.
 - ii) Shepherd passing through the State may graze the flocks in any undemarcated forest in which such grazing not expressively prohibited by the Forest Officer.
 - iii) The shepherds described in the above sub section, may remain free of charge for one night at one place or at most for two nights for any special reasons such as heavy rain or snow or giving salt to their flocks. If they halt longer than this they will be charged grazing fee.

- iv) The right to realize the grazing dues mentioned in sub section (1) and (3) is entirely in the hands of the Superintendent, hill states.
- 17.** The Shepherds provided for in the preceding paragraph may within the areas over which they graze, take dry fallen wood only for fuel and lop trees for fodder and in respect of such lopping they are subject to the same restrictions.
- 18.** Whenever cultivated or grass (Ghasni) land assessed to revenue has been included in the limits of any demarcated forests, all rights not provided for in this record which have hitherto been exercised just as if the land had not been included in the demarcated forest.
- 19.** All rights admitted are subject to the condition that all right holders shall render every assistance in extinguishing any fire occurring in any forest within which they have right, whether they have been called upon to do so or not and in the cases of willful neglect the Superintendent, hill states, may order that all or any rights in a forest damaged by fire be suspended for any period he consider proper.

APPENDIX-II (iii)

RIGHTS AND CONCESSIONS IN KEONTHAL STATE

The forest settlement constituted the following three kinds of forests:

1. Reserved Forests (Rakhs) are forests which are the absolute property of the state and no rights are admitted. They are termed as “R/13 Tarab”.
2. First Class Protected Forests (Mahfuzas) are forests where rights are admitted to a limited extent. The underlying object constituting these forests was ultimately to convert them into Reserved Forests. They are termed as “1/12 Kufta.”
3. Second class Protected Forests (Mahdudas) are forests open to all rights of user. They are termed as “2/16 Gharail”.

Complete record of rights of each forest has been given in the forest settlement. Detailed notes on the various rights as exercised are given in the following paragraphs.

1. “Nautors”

Nautors are not granted in demarcated forests except with the previous permission of the local Government obtained through the Superintendent, hill state. Nautors in dehats are usually not granted as the villagers have rights there in and they object almost invariably. Nautors in other areas are granted by the Raja at his will on payment of some fixed nazrana.

2. Timber for building purpose

Every land holder in the State has a right to receive trees for this purpose at the reduced rate sanctioned by the State. Trees thus acquired are not to be disposed off to anyone else and must be used for the grantee's bonafide requirements for the construction or repair of his house.

The following scale of fee is charged.

The revenue realised from these sales is credited to the State. The following rules are laid down by the settlement:

- i) Trees for repair and construction purpose will be granted once in five years, except when the house is accidently damaged or burnt in which case the above restriction is waived.
- ii) Timber distribution will be held by the Forest Department in April and October each year.
- iii) The period for the cutting and removal of trees from the forest will be six months. No timber will be removed after the expiry of this period except on payment of a small fee.
- iv) Trees, if available silviculturally, will usually be granted from the forest in which the applicant has such right.
- v) Trees will not be given from a demarcated forest if the demand could be met from a neighbouring dehat area, even though the applicant may have a right in such forest.

3. Those are given free after due permission for the following purpose:-

- i) For construction or repair of water mills.
- ii) For a bridge or a water channel.
- iii) For marriage ceremonies on verification by the lambardar.
- iv) For cremation and funeral ceremonies.
- v) For private religious ceremonies such as "jags" "dharma shant", "Chhochha" "Bakra langna".
- vi) For ploughs and other agricultural implements.
- vii) For implements required in connection with burning of charcoal.
- viii) For construction and repair of temples.

4. Grazing of animals of right holders

Except the areas which are closed under the provisions of settlement, all the forests are open to all kinds of animals. Grass cutting is also permitted in all the demarcated and undemarcated forests.

5. Rahdari Fees

In accordance with past custom, fees called "rahdari" are collected from gujjars and shepherds, who pass through this State on their way to grazing grounds in the adjoining State. The rates charged are as follows:

Buffaloes, Cows, Ponies, Mules etc.	Annas two (12p) per head.
Sheep and Goats	Annas one (6p) per head.
Sheep and Goats of Kanawaris for backward and forward trip through Sawra.	Pies six (3p) per head.

The fees are charged once for both the outward and return journeys. Grazing is only permitted in the dehat forests, and they are not allowed to stay for more than one night in one place. Exception is made in case of bad weather or if the sheep and goats have been given salt, in which case they are allowed to stay for two nights. The distance between the two halting places must in no case be less than 5 miles. Contravention of any of these regulations makes them liable to pay the full grazing dues.

6. Lopping

The right of lopping a tree up to half its height is admitted in the case of all trees except Deodar. In cases where no other tree is available for lopping except Deodar, the lopping of Deodar is also permitted upto 1/3 its height. No tree with a girth of less than 1-1/2 (45cm) at breast height may be lopped. The admission of this right in the settlement has resulted in the destruction of large area of dehat forests, and in a few places, of demarcated forest as well. The situation is getting serious as the burden is now increasing on the demarcated forests producing big obstacles in the way of systematic management of these areas. The settlement report, while admitting this right foresaw the difficulty and made a definite prescription that this right should be gradually report elucidates the position:

“The system of lopping the trees in this State is very objectionable as it renders the trees useless. It is very necessary that this system is gradually stopped. The forests officials should pay special attention towards this. It is very difficult to check this old evil nor can only be laid in “mahfuja” and ‘mahduda’ forests but extended to dehat and malkiyats so that the zamindars may appreciate and be accustomed to new methods and the forests may be spared.”

During the time the forests were under the Punjab Forest Department, the lopping of Deodar in all Demarcated Forests was entirely stopped and lopping of Kail very largely so. In Demarcated Forests in which lopping of Kail is still practiced, villagers have rights to obtain Kail for building timber and fallen needles for manure. All three rights in one area are impossible. Once a Kail is lopped, the production of needles in sufficient quantities to be collected of the ground ceases for many years. Fungus usually gets into the tree and renders it useless for building timber. Efforts made in the past should be continued unabated till the zamindars begin to see the evil effects of this practice.

7. Miscellaneous Rights

8. In addition to the main rights given above in some detail the following are admitted in all protected forests:

- i) Removal of all fallen and dry timber.
- ii) Removal of dry trees, except those of Deodar Kail and Chil, for purposes of cremation.
- iii) Removal of stumps of all kinds for fire wood provided that the mark is kept intact.
- iv) Removal of all standing trees, except Deodar, Kail, Chil, Spruce, Silver fir, Ban, Mohru, Kharsu, and Walnut for purposes of firewood, provided that the forest officer may prohibit such removal at any time.
- v) Removal of fallen branches and tree tops by black smiths for charcoal burning.
- vi) Removal of Taku, Bhail, Darli, and Kahu bushes making baskets or for personal use by the basket makers.
- vii) Removal of kaith brass and kahu wood for making walking sticks or for personal use by carpenters.
- viii) Debarking of logs given for repair of tools or of dry trees of inferior species by chamars.
- ix) Removal of shrubs, wild fruits and poants, banaksha and honey for sale or for personal use.
- x) Removal of torch wood from stumps, provided that the mark is not erased. Torch wood may also be removed from all dry trees with the previous permission of the Forest Officer.
- xi) Removal of stones and slates from approved quarries with the previous permission of the Forest Officer.
- xii) Removal of Nirgal for household use.
- xiii) Removal of litter for manure.
- xiv) Removal of creepers for household use.
- xv) Non-right holders whether agriculturists or otherwise, can graze their cattle in dehat areas on the payment of grazing fees. They can also take trees and firewood on payment of certain fixed fees. The concession is liable to be withdrawn at any time.
- xvi) If any time it is feared that the exercise of rights in a certain forest endangers its existence, the forest officer is empowered to restrict such rights to extent to which the forest can bear them. This step will however, be taken after making full investigation on the spot.

9. Right in Ghasnis

The owners of ghasnis are permitted to do the following acts in their malkiyats:

- i) To take tree free of charge for their bonafide personal use after obtaining a permit from the atate.
- ii) To cut grass without permit.
- iii) To lop all tree under rules in force for the time being.
- iv) To make all other forest produce for their own bonafide use without permit.

10. Act prohibited

- i) Right holders may not sell or give on contract the rights of grazing, nor can they permit others to exercise their rights.
- ii) All produce obtained from the forests for their bonafide requirements must be used as such and not sold or exchanged with any other person.
- iii) Debarking of green trees is prohibited.
- iv) Girdling a tree in order to kill it is prohibited.
- v) Removal of torchwood from the following trees is prohibited.
 - a) Deodar, whether standing or fallen, green or dry.
 - b) Standing Kail, Chil, Spruce or Silver Fir.
- vi) Tapping any tree for resin.
- vii) Breaking up land, without the previous permission of the proper authority, in any demarcated, undemarcated or ghasni areas.
- viii) To set fire to forests. In case of incendiary or want on fires, the rights of all persons living in the neighbourhood will be suspended by enforcing and punitive closure.
- ix) To burn panwis in the absence of a forest official.
- x) To shoot mammals or other game without permission.

APPENDIX-II (IV)

RECORD OF RIGHTS (Abstract) OF PATIALA STATE

1. Definition

The customs which were prevailing before Mr. Miniken's Forest Settlement formed the basis for determining and recording rights of the people. The rights with restrictions and limitations as were admitted in the forests Settlements referred to above have been enjoyed by the people since then with such alternations and modifications as the circumstances of the latter periods suggested. Thus they have acquired legal status and can be claimed, as a matter of right by the right holders subject to the restrictions and limitations herein after mentioned. Forest rights have been generally allowed to the proprietors of revenue paying land and their agricultural tenants. The basis of Settlement is that rights are appendent to cultivated land paying revenue and can only be acquired with such land. They are meant to satisfy the ordinary agricultural requirements and can be claimed, as a matter of right, for the bonafide requirements of the right holders and not to meet the demand of the forest produce from outside, or for any trade purposes.

2. Right holders

- a) Right holders are the proprietary body of the villages in whose name the common waste is recorded in the revenue papers in proportion to the land revenue paid. To satisfy the requirements of a right holder, one must be (1) the owner of cultivated land assessed to revenue (2) have a share in the village waste in proportion to the land revenue paid. Such persons may be termed as 1st class right holders.
- b) The 2nd class of right holders is the body of non agriculturists dependent on the village community such as village shopkeepers, kamin etc who have accustomed to the exercised of rights in the village waste and forest. The rights given to them are as a mark of grace, and may be exercise for their own domestic requirements. The privileges can be withdrawn in case of continuous abuse of rights. They will be entitled to such privileges as have been mentioned in the rules in **Appendix XV and XVI**.

The special characteristic of the Ist class right holders is that they hold the rights by virtue of their proprietorship in the land, quit distinct from the second class right holders who only posses the right by virtue of their exercising them.

3. Grazing

Perhaps the most distinctive right to which the villagers as well as the forest department are attached is the right of grazing. From the villager's point of view, it is

impossible to discontinue this right, while the Forest Department is persistent in closing this right. The right was exercised without any restriction in the former times and it was in Mr. Mimiken's Settlement that an attempt was made to restrict it in the interest of Forest Conservancy.

4. Right of Cattle in Ist Class Forest

In Ist class forest Mr. Mimiken's with the object of regulating the grazing incidence and so preserving the soil and vegetation set limits to the number of cattle which might be grazed. Rai Bahadur Kahan Chand abolished this system in the Forest Settlement of 1965 which was, of course, neither sanctioned nor brought in to operation. I cannot agree with his reason that such restrictions are practically useless. I have therefore allowed the grazing right in Ist class forest in the same manner as was done by Mr. Mimiken and to this the villagers are quit agreeable.

5. i) In First Class Forests

Major Pophem Young, Settlement Commissioner Patiala and Rai Bahadur Kahan Chand Forest Settlement Officer, recognized the villagers possession over the area preserved for grass cutting and recorded them in their individual names according to some sold divisions among them and assessed the areas to a rent varying from six pies (3p) to one anna (6p) per bigha, the income thus collected being credited towards Forest Receipts. Miniken allowed the right of cutting grass to the village community collectively while Rai Bahadur Kahan Chand recognized their individual Ghasnies.

This most intricate aspect of the question can be understood fully by studying the gradual development and change of the collective right to an individual ownership since the time forest settlement was conducted by Mr. Miniken. To admit and to allow a collective right to the village community differs widely from recording and recognizing a certain plot under the possession of an individual. This will eventually lead to the claim of the ownership by the successors. At that stage it will be very difficult to adjust the social conflicts. On the appeal by the forest department against Rai Bahadur Kahan Chand's Settlement the recommendations of the settlement officer were not admitted by dewam Nar Narain Singh, and no rent on the ghasnies or grass lands in Ist class forests has since been recorded. In the present revision of Settlement, I have admitted this right in the same spirit and in essence and substance as Mr. Miniken held with a slight modification that the right of grass cutting in Ist class forest will be regulated by the issue of permits on nominal fee so as to make the right in case of closures of are for cultural operations under the prescriptions of new working plan.

6. IInd Class Forests

In 2nd class forests, grass lands are assessed to a tax in the forest rules sanctioned by I Jlas-I Khas in 1912 and rent on them has been charged and credited towards forest receipt as originally recommended by Rai Bahadur Kahan Chand. I have no deviation in this respect.

7. Timber Trees

In earlier times when Mr. Miniken's Forest Settlement was conducted, presumably there was no extra ordinary demand for timber trees and as such no limits to the number of trees required by right holders were fixed. With the opening of Shimla hill stations and the change of style of living of the people, the demand for timber trees increased. An attempt was made to put a restriction on the excessive demand by the Patiala Forest Rule of 1912 A.D.

It has although to a very small extent worked in the right direction. In recent years, there has been a constant demand for a large number of trees by the villagers in the vicinity of cantonment especially civil station, Shimla, and the timber trees obtained on concessional rates for bonafide requirements were sold or passed through the connivance of the forest guards in the proximity of Shimla. As a matter of fact, a right holder is entitled to get timber trees as may be sufficient for one suitable and convenient house ordinarily found among the cultivators. The right is not meant to meet the requirements of the timber for a bungalow or kothi. It has been attempted in the rules to define the limitation within the trees will be granted. A zamindar having a small patch of cultivated land could claim same or even greater number of trees than actually given to a zamindar possessing a considerable area of cultivated and waste land as there was no restriction. A principle has been introduced that one tree should be given for every rupee of revenue paid, as it will limit the unreasonably demand of trees by villagers. To limit this restriction on the other direction, the minimum number of trees to be granted at zamindari rates is suggested at five and maximum at fifteen, of which not more than five will be of Deodar-Kail and not more than eight of Chil in the Chil zone. But this is the maximum and no claim can be made for this maximum. The right extends to a sufficient aMoUnt of timber for agricultural building only. The rule only limits the number of trees to be given, but full market rates should be charged for them. The limits for the grant of trees after ten years and five years for construction and repair of buildings respectively, as was imposed in the rules of 1912 A.D. has been retained as trees are claimed year by year. Of course, in case of natural calamities i.e. fire etc. the trees can be granted before the prescribed number of years, and on this point the conservator of forests decision shall be final.

8. Lopping

Lopping of trees is very common in these hills. The zamindars require the leaves of trees for fodder, manure and also for fencing and fuel. There are some trees of no value or of little value which are lopped for the above purpose, but quite a good number of important species such as Deodar, Kail, Chil and blue pine are also lopped. Lopping of these species is most detrimental and in some of these forests it has done considerable damage to the forest crop. It was also not possible in all places to discard this right as the villagers claimed it is a traditional practice and as one of the most important factors of their agricultural requirements. On the other hand, clearance of under growth from coniferous forests makes the ground available for the reproduction of the principle timber species. The lopping of trees is a right which must be restricted as far as possible, as it is injurious to the life and vitality of the tree. The restrictions imposed in Mr. Minikens Settlement and the forest rules of 1912 A.D. were no doubt, sufficient in the interest of trees growth, but they have been simplified in order to make their application practicable. These restrictions refer to the size of trees and the height to which the trees may lop.

9. Rules for Ist & 2nd Class Forests

Rules for the reserved and protected (Ist & 2nd Class forests) have been made. They are found on the record of rights and embody the principal restrictions, which have, more or less, been explained here to before.

10. 3rd Class of Forests and their Definition

All village and waste land other than cultivated areas outside the demarcated forests may be termed as 3rd class forest which belong to the villagers except that control over the trees and the proprietary right over the mines and quarries will rest with His Highness Government as provided in the rules. This definition has been modified from the Patiala Village Forest Rules sanctioned by IJlas-i-Khas on Home Ministers arzdes No. 442 dated 17/12/1912. A draft notification under chapter III of the Indian Forest Act of 1927, declaring such areas as village forests is submitted herewith (vide **Appendix.**)

11. Facilities in the grant of timber from IIIrd class forests.

No modification is required in the present procedure in case of trees for grants which are given by the range officers for domestic and agricultural requirement:-

1. For fuel for marriage requirements.
2. For fuel for funeral ceremonies.
3. For making agricultural implements and
4. Charcoal for smithy purposes.

12. Royal trees

In 1981 B certain valuable timber trees, growing in the assessed lands belonging to the zamindars outside the demarcated forests, were declared as 'Royal trees' in order

to stop their indiscriminate cutting by the land owners and to stop their existence. It is understood that the trees were declared as 'Royal trees' under gracious commands of his highness. There is a great felling among the villagers about the restrictions of permission imposed on the cutting of these trees for their domestic requirements. The forest department has not been able to supply a copy of IJlas-i-Khas orders according to which certain species were declared as 'Royal trees' but say that there were orders which are not traceable in record at present. It is, of course, an admitted fact that the restrictions have been in practice from some years past. It necessary to continue the restriction for purpose of sale and to stop the destruction of these valuable trees, but to remove their present grievances, it is suggested that they may be permitted to cut 'Royal trees' growing in their cultivated lands for their domestic requirement without imposing any restriction beyond that the owner should inform the range officers about the felling, number and the girth of trees. The range officer should satisfy through his subordinates or himself that the trees are rightly cut and used for bonafide domestic requirements and that there has been no abuse. Trees cut for domestic requirements should be over 3' (90) cm in girth and the number of 'Royal trees' under these limits should not be earlier more than five. No smaller trees of girth under 3feet should be out as it is incapable of yielding sound timber.

The misuse of such timber be treated as a forest offence and will be punishable under section 77 of the Indian Forest Act 16 of 1927. In the case of sale of such timber of trees the permission will have to be obtained from the conservator of forests, who after careful consideration may permit the sale in rare cases under special circumstances. A draft notification declared the following tree as 'Royal trees' is appended herewith (**Vide Appendix**).

1. Deodar
2. Thund
3. Akhrot
4. Kakar
5. Kirmon
6. Shisham

RECORD OF RIGHTS OF DHAMI STATE

(An extract from the report on the 1st Regular Settlement of 1916 of the Dhami State)

1. Forests, all the waste lands bearing trees and bushes have been treated as Demarcated Forest by the State. The total number of such forest is 27 and their names are given below:-

(1) Chuhi Jhakri, (2) Hiri Ki besak (3) Lahog Ki ghar (4) Ratanpur-ki chaili, (5) Barahag- ka-nall (6) Chahian ki bandrahi,(7) Shamlun,(8) Badu, (9) Bereli,(10) Kahal-ka pash,(11) Bag ka nal, (12) Bhanar ka dhank and katal ,(13) Khil,(14) Shanbog and Chharu,(15) Pandash bara, (16) Pandash chhota,(17) Shilli,ghasni, (18) Bhari ka dehra,(19) Sangheh,(20) Jubbar ki nail, (21) Salon,(22) Dalimon,(23) Talwari and Ban ka ghat, (24) Ghanoi, (25) Ghatru,(26) Dabban and (27) Shahal-Dhala.

2. Boundary:-

There were neither any boundary pillar of these forests on the spot nor could the Forest officials define the limits. The measurement and demarcation of the forests proved rather difficult and I had to rely on the demarcation of the zaminda. Separate maps have been prepared for the forests of Chahian and Hiri ki beshak and treated as separate estates, while other forests being small areas have been included in the respective villages in which they lie.

3. Record of Rights:-

No Record of Rights has been drawn up in the course of settlement. Only Ban and Chil are the chief forest trees in the state. A few kelo trees are also found as noted in para 4. Besides, there are many shrubs undergrowth in the forests.

4. Ghasnies:-

Some ghasnies have been included in the demarcated forests and have not been assessed but the rights of the zamindars for grass have been admitted therein. These ghasnies should be assessed at the revenue rate and the income derived therefrom included in the forest revenue. Such areas as they have not been measured in this settlement rights might now be measured for the purposes of assessment.

5. Wild Animals:-

Wild animals such as kakar, ghorar, hare, monkeys, etc and birds such as wild fowls, chakor, pheasants, etc are found abundantly in these forests. The state also abounds in beasts like leopards, etc.

6. Shooting:-

Shootings are strictly prohibited in the state. The zamindars can, however frighten the wild animals with sham firing for the protection of their crops, but they can not kill the animals or birds without permission in any case.

7. Game:-

There is very good game in the State. The forest near the Ghana bazaar is reserved for his excellency the viceroy. These forests should be carefully protected in future. In the fields of the zamindars walnut are the only fruit bearing trees.

8. Natural Products

In the fields of the zamindars walnuts are the only fruit bearing trees, the hill pomegranate plants, however, grow in the ghasnis, waste and forest lands. The zamindars collect the fruit and sell it: the state does not levy any tax. Besides these kaphal fruit trees are found in the paragnas of Dhamer, Nerwa and Bahri. Most of the fruit is used by the zamindars themselves and very little is sold in the Ghana Bazar.

9. Classification of Soil

The following are the classes of soil which bear the local names as used by the agriculturists.

- (1) Kiar
- (2) Kalaha
- (3) Bakhil andarli and bahirli.
- (4) Kultheran
- (5) Ghasni
- (6) Banjar
- (7) Ghairmumkin.

Of these the first two classes are abi, the next three barani and the remaining three are uncultivated lands.

NOTIFICATION

Whereas, the draft Himachal Pradesh Forest (Timber Distribution to the right holders) Rules, 2009 were published in the Rajpatra, Himachal Pradesh Extra Ordinary on 14.10.2009 vide Notification of even number dated 13.10.2009 for inviting objections and suggestions from persons likely to be effected thereby within a period of 21 days from the date of publication; Now, after receipt and analyzing the objections/suggestions received from the concerned parties, in exercise of the powers conferred by clause (L) of section 32 of the Indian Forest Act, 1927 (16 of 1927), the Governor of Himachal Pradesh is pleased to make the following rules namely:-

1. Short title - These rules shall be called the Himachal Pradesh Forest (Timber Distribution to the Right Holders) Rules, 2010.

2. Definitions - (1) In these rules, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (a) 'Government' means the Government of Himachal Pradesh;
 - (b) The term 'below poverty line' shall have meaning as assigned to it by the Department of Panchayati Raj, Himachal Pradesh;
 - (c) 'Right Holder' means a person entitled to exercise rights recorded in the 'record of rights' as per the forest settlement report of the area concerned;
 - (d) 'Record of rights' means, rights recorded in the forest settlement reports;
 - (e) 'Timber Distribution' means the policy of distribution of timber to the right holders as per record of rights recorded in the forest settlement reports; and
 - (f) 'Timber Distribution Rights' means right of a right holder having cultivable lands for grant of timber for construction of residential house and cow shed etc for bonafide domestic use of the right holder, recorded in the forest settlement report of the area concerned;
- (2) All other words and expressions used but not defined in these rules shall have the meaning assigned to them in the Indian Forest Act, 1927.

3. Entitlement:-Timber shall be granted to the right holders who have their recorded rights in the concerned Forest Settlement Reports for grant of Timber Distribution for construction/maintenance of residential house, cow sheds etc for bonafide domestic use:

Provided that:-

- (i) No Timber Distribution shall be granted in urban area;
- (ii) No Timber Distribution shall be granted if trees to meet the requirement of timber for construction of residential house, cowshed etc are available on the land holdings of the Right Holder concerned. However, he shall have the right to fell trees from his own land as per the provisions of the Himachal Pradesh Land Preservation Act, 1978 and rules made there under;
- (iii) No Timber Distribution shall be granted for 10 years if the right holder has sold trees yielding timber for construction of houses from his private land holding;

(iv) In case right holder has land holding at more than one place, he shall have option of getting Timber Distribution at one place only. For this purpose a right holder shall submit an affidavit clarifying therein his rights of Timber Distribution at different places and his place of option for getting Timber Distribution. Option once exercised shall not be allowed to be changed;

(v) With effect from the date of notification of these rules, no Timber Distribution shall be granted to a land owner who has purchased land after obtaining the permission of the Government under section 118 of the Tenancy and Land Reforms Act, 1972, irrespective of the date of purchase of such land.

(vi) Timber Distribution shall be granted only to the head of the family as per the revenue records;

(vii) Timber Distribution shall not be granted for the construction/maintenance of buildings to be used for commercial and hiring purposes;

(viii) Timber Distribution shall not be granted to the right holders, if trees for the purpose are not available silviculturally in the forest where concerned right holders have Timber Distribution right;

(ix) Timber Distribution rights shall be subject to cooperation and participation of right holders in forest conservancy. In case any right holder fails to perform his duties for apprehending offenders, extinguishing fire or commits any forest offence as contained in the forest settlement report, his right of Timber Distribution shall be suspended upto 10 years; and

(x) Timber Distribution Right of a right holder shall be suspended upto 10 years if he is found to have misutilized the Timber

3 Distribution grants or committed any forest offence until he is eligible again for Timber Distribution.

4. Quantity: - (1) Timber Distribution shall be granted in converted form from the depots to be specified separately as per scale fixed below:-

(i) For construction of new house = 3 cubic meters; and

(ii) For maintenance = 1 cubic meter.

(2) Timber Distribution shall be given from salvage (fallen, dry standing), silviculturally available green trees in the order of preference.

5. Periodicity: - The periodicity for grant of Timber Distribution to the right holders will be as under:-

(i) For new construction once in life time or 30 years whichever is later;

(ii) For additions/alterations – once in 15 years; and

(iii) Sufferers of natural calamities/fire sufferers: as per actual requirement as recommended by the Sub Divisional Officer (Civil) and after personal verification by the ACF/DFO concerned subject to the grant not exceeding the maximum limit prescribed under rule-4.

6. Rates: - The rates to be charged from the different types of right holders for grant of Timber Distribution will be as under:-

- (i) Right Holders above poverty line - 30 percent of the rates at which timber is sold by the Himachal Pradesh State Forest Development Corporation Ltd. commercially;
- (ii) Right holders below poverty line - 10 percent of the rates at which timber is sold by the Himachal Pradesh State Forest Development Corporation Ltd. commercially; and
- (iii) Right Holders suffering from natural calamities - Free of cost.

7. Priority for grant of Timber Distribution - Priority for grant of Timber

Distribution shall be given to the right holders belonging to below poverty line. Right holders above poverty line shall be granted Timber Distribution on first come first served basis.

8. Procedure for grant of Timber Distribution - Application for grant of Timber Distribution, on the form appended to these rules as 'Annexure-I' shall be submitted by right holder (s) to the Panchayat concerned after getting necessary remarks from the patwari concerned. The Panchayat after ascertaining genuineness of the requirement of the right holders shall pass resolution in the Gram Sabha of the Panchayat indicating actual quantity of requirement of Timber Distribution of the individual (s) concerned. After resolution recommending grant of Timber Distribution is passed by the concerned panchayat, right holders shall submit his Timber for distribution application to the Forest Guard of the area who shall enter the same in the register maintained for the purpose and issue receipt of the application to the Right Holder. He shall send his recommendations to the Block Officer after ascertaining the genuineness of demand, who in turn shall submit his recommendations to the range officer. After receipt of Timber Distribution application from the range officer, the divisional forest officer shall take action for sanction of the Timber Distribution after satisfying himself about the genuineness of the requirement and silvicultural availability of trees/timber in the concerned forest and intimate his decision/ Timber Distribution grant to the Right Holder concerned on the proforma appended to these rules as 'Annexure II'. A schedule for grant of Timber Distribution shall be framed and notified for publicity to all panchayats and other functionaries in the forest division by the divisional forest officer.

9. Time schedule for grant of Timber Distribution.-The right holders shall apply for grant of Timber Distribution through concerned Panchayat to the concerned forest guard by 31st March of each year. The application shall be processed and Timber Distribution shall be given to eligible right holders between September to December of the year as per procedure under rule-8 and no Timber Distribution shall be granted thereafter for that year.

10. Jurisdiction of the use of Timber - Timber granted under these rules shall be allowed to be carried within revenue estate without obtaining any permission after affixing of Timber Distribution hammer and if the timber is to be carried out from one estate to another, the right holder shall have to obtain a permission from the range officer concerned for this purpose. Timber granted shall be utilized by the right holder within a period of maximum one year. In case, Timber Distribution

grant could not be utilized within the specified period, concerned divisional forest officer shall grant extension for its use based on the genuineness of the case. The divisional forest officer shall ensure through his staff that the Timber Distribution grant is used for the purpose for which it was sanctioned. In case Timber Distribution grant is not utilized during the permissible period, the same may be seized by the forest department and the decision taken by the divisional forest Officer relating to grant of Timber Distribution shall be final.

11. Depot - The depots from where Timber Distribution in converted form shall be supplied to the right holders shall be notified by the divisional forest officer every year. Any change during the next year in the place of these depots shall also be notified. These notifications shall be widely circulated up to the Panchayat level by the divisional forest officer.

12. Size and dimensions of Timber Distribution timber - The Timber Distribution timber shall be converted and sold in different sizes other than standard sizes made by Himachal Pradesh State Forest Development Corporation Ltd. for commercial purpose.

13. Monitoring of data base and checking - The data regarding details of right holders, options exercised by the right holders, Timber Distribution granted, utilized, etc. shall be maintained and monitored panchayat and range wise by the Divisional forest officer concerned. This data shall further be monitored and evaluated by Chief Conservator of Forests (Monitoring and Evaluation) at Sundernagar and annual report sent to Principal Chief Conservator of Forests, Himachal Pradesh.

14. Penalty and Punishment: - The right holders who;

- (i) Misuse of Timber Distribution for commercial purpose;
- (ii) Sells Timber Distribution;
- (iii) Transports timber outside the jurisdiction of Revenue estate without permission;
- (iv) Utilizes Timber Distribution after the time schedule given in permit has expired; and
- (v) Do not participate in the duties enshrined in the forest settlement report alongwith rights, shall be penalized as per relevant provisions of Indian Forest Act, 1927, in addition to suspension of their rights for such period as may be determined by the concerned Divisional Forest Officer.

15. Repeals and savings - (1) The existing rules, notifications, directions and instructions framed and issued by the Government or Himachal Pradesh Forest Department concerning the Timber Distribution to the right holders are hereby repealed and rescinded.

(2) Notwithstanding such repeal or recession any action taken or anything done under the rules so repealed and notifications, directions and instructions framed and issued so rescinded shall be deemed to have been taken or done under the corresponding provisions of these rules.

No. Fts. (A) 3-1/77 - In exercise of powers conferred under sections 41 and 42 of the India Forest Act, 1927 (16 of 1927), the president of India is pleased to make the following rules further to amend the Himachal Pradesh Forest Produce Transit (Land Routes) Rules, 1978 and published in the Rajpatra, Himachal Pradesh (Extra-ordinary), dated the 5th March, 1979 vide this Department Notification of even number, dated 20-11-1978, namely:-

1. *Short title*— These rules shall be called the Himachal Pradesh Forest Produce Transit (Land Routes) (Amendment Rules, 1993.
2. *Amendment of rules 5*— In rule 5 of the Himachal Pradesh Forest Produce Transit (Land Routes) Rules, 1978 (hereinafter called the “said rules”) after the words, “any forest produce” but before the words, “that does not bear”, the words and signs “other than fuel wood, khairwood, bamboos, charcoal, medicinal plants and seeds” shall be inserted.
3. *Amendment of rules 6*— In rule 6 of the said rules, after the words “forest produce” but before the words “by land routes”, the words and signs “other than fuel wood, Khairwood, bamboos, charcoal, medicinal plants and seeds” shall be inserted.
4. *Amendment of rules 10*— In rule 10 of the said rules, for the words “timber or for such timber” appearing after the words “any unmarked”, but before the words “as bears” the words and signs “forest produce other than fuel wood, Khairwood,, bamboos, charcoal, medicinal plants and seeds” shall be substituted.
5. *Amendment of rules 11*— In rule 11 of the said rules, for sub-rule (5), the following shall be substituted, namely:-
“(5) The issuing authority shall also determine the other conditions subject to which the pass shall be issued and shall also determine the period for which the pass shall remain valid. However, the validity of any pass shall under no circumstances exceed a period of six months including any extension (S) allowed. A fee of Rs. 25/- shall be leviable for the issue of such a pass except in case of medicinal plants for which the fee shall be as per Annexure ‘D’ ”.
6. *Amendment of rules 18*— For rule 18 of the said rules, the following shall be substituted, namely:-
“18. Ban on booking forest produce by rail. By post and by air:- No person shall offer any forest produce for export by rail on any railway station or by post at

any post office or by air on any airport within Himachal Pradesh, unless a pass has been issued under these rules and no railway, postal. Airport authority shall accept for transport/transmission any forest produce by rail, post or air, unless it is accompanied by a valid pass”.

7. Amendment of rules 20— In rule 20 of the said rules, for the words “six months” appearing after the word, “extends to”, but before the words “or with”, the words “two years” shall be substituted and for figure ‘5000’ wrds “five thousand” shall be substituted.
8. Insertion of New Annexure ‘D’:- After Annexure ‘C’ to said rules, the following, cw Annexure ‘D’ shall be inserted, namely:

In exercise of the powers of the conferred under sub-section (2) of the Indian Forest Act, 1927 the Governor Himachal Pradesh is pleased to appoint Pradhan of the Gram Panchayats in Himachal Pradesh Forest Officer to carry out the purpose of rule 11 of the Himachal Pradesh Forest Produce Transit (Land Routes) Rules 1978 for the issuance of pass for transport of minor forest produce collected from the forests in the concerned panchyat subject to the conditions that the provisions of the Himachal Pradesh Forest Produce Transit (Land Routes) Rules notified vide notification No. Fts (A)-3-1/77, dated 20.11.1978 and and published in the Rajpatra, Himachal Pradesh (Extra Ordinary) dated 5th march, 1978 as amended from time to time by the Government shall be adhered to.

2. The Governor Himachal Pradesh is further pleased to order that the Pradhan to the concerned Panchyats shall issue pass for the item/species numbers 37 as listed in (**ANNEXURE-A**) to this Notification as per export fee prescribed therein and the fee so realized shall from the revenue of the Gram Panchayats.
3. The Governor Himachal Pradesh is further pleased to order that the Forest Guard of the area shall make recommendations to issue pass after verifying that the species for which such pass is to be issued are not banned for export and that the species are extracted from the prescribed are in the approved extaction cycle and that the extraction has been done in sustainable manner and has not caused any ecological or environmental damage. No adherance to the above conditions may debar a Pradhan from issuing the pass for export and in such a case the powers shall revert to the issuance of this Notification.

NOTIFICATION

In super-session of the Department order No. FFE-B-A (3)-3/2000 dated 25-09-2001 regarding introduction of bill/tender system & payment through cheques system the following guiding principles are to be adopted by the Forest Department with immediate effect:-

A. For introduction of Bill/Tender system for works including CAT Plan and Project related works in the department (including plantation Fire Protection, Soil Conservation etc.

- 1) All works of Forest Department should be done on bill basis except where already continuing daily wagers are involved, who are working for last many years and can not be removed. In such cases Muster Roll may be issued with the prior approval/authorization of DFO Concerned.
- 2) Component wise bills should be prepared for plantation works (such as bush cutting), preparation of fence post, digging of pits and planting, fencing etc.) to ensure timely supervision and completion of each item and to avoid delay in execution as well as payment. There are some works which need to be regularly and constantly supervised during the execution of works as these are technical in nature.

- Collection of seed.
- Sowing of seeds
- Watering of nursery beds/polythene bags.
- Shifting of Polythene bags.
- Digging of pots & planting etc.

For these work, the Forest Guard/Dy. Ranger will have to certify that these works have been supervised by him during the currency of the work and has been done as per the technical requirement.

B. Introduction of cheque system of payment of labourer/contractor.

With a twin objective of minimizing cash transaction and bringing transparency, as far as possible, all payments should be made through electronic transfer of cheque. In no case payment of aMoUnt above Rs.5000/- should be made in cash. If need be, cheques can be handed over to Range Forest Officer by the Divisional Forest Officer for further handing over to the payee so that the payee does not have to come from distant places to Division Office to collect the cheques. After obtaining payee's receipt, R.O. will submit it to the Divisional Forest Officer.

C. Execution of Works

1. Work upto Rs. One lakh should be allowed to be executed on bill basis on sanctioned schedule of rates without calling for quotations.
2. Work above Rs. One lakh and up to Five lakhs should be done on quotation basis.
3. Work above Rs. Five lakhs should be done on tender basis, for which tender rules/procedure will be framed by Forest Department.
4. All building work should be done on tender basis irrespective of the cost.

Above suggested system(A toC) should be applicable to all works of the Forest Department including CAT Plan and Projects provided these are not at variance with the system suggested by the funding agency, in which case the system recommended by the funding agency shall be followed.

However, Assistant Conservator of Forests will inspect the work from Rupees 3.00 lac to 5.00 lac and Divisional Forest Officer will inspect the work above Rs. 5.00 lac before making payment to the contractor.

Copy of the letter no. Ft.1259-15/67(S) dated 18.02.1995 from principal CCF/HP to all CCFs/CFs (T) in Himachal Pradesh.

Subject: Resin tapping operations in H.P. during 1995 tapping season.

Please refer to item No. 5.6 of proceeding of CFs meeting held on 29-30th November, 1994 circulated vide this office letter dated 8th December, 1994.

CF Dharamshala in consultation with Indian Council of forestry Research & Education, Dehradun has been able to arrange a field visit on 14.01.1995 by experts from Dehradun and copy of their tour report dated 03.02.1995 is enclosed herewith for information and further necessary action. In the light of field observations, it has been decided for 1995 resin tapping season that following instruction will be followed uniformly in all divisions where resin tapping operations are to be done in Government forests:

- a) In case of new resin lots minimum tapping diameter shall be kept at 35 cm compared to existing 30cm.
- b) No wrong fixation of rill to be done on trees having been tapped earlier by cup and lip method. Such trees should be deleted from 1995 resin tapping works.
- c) Readymade acid paste to be used by HPSFC.
- d) No resin tapping shall be done on chil tree below 35 cm dbh in plantation areas and PB IV areas of Chil Working Circle from 1995 tapping season.

The DFOs be also enjoined to persuade owners of private chil trees to follow these instructions so that mortality in chil trees due to wrong/excessive use of acid is totally avoided.

APPENDIX-X (i)

NOTIFICATION

No.FFE-B-A93)-3/2010

Dated 05-05-2010.

In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 68 of the Indian Forest Act, 1927 read with directions issued by the Hon'ble High Court of Himachal Pradesh vide its judgement dated 28.8.2009 in COPC No.56/2009, titled as Kuldip Singh Chauhan Vs Balbir Singh and others and in supersession of all the previous guidelines issued on the subject, the Governor, Himachal Pradesh is pleased to empower all the Range Officers-in-charge of the ranges to compound forest offences and to accept compensation and/or release the seized property as mentioned in the aforesaid section. The regulation of the compounding of forest offences, disposal of the cases of illicit felling and other forest offences shall be as under:-

1. Cases not liable to be compounded:- The following are the cases which shall not be compounded, namely:-

- i) Illicit transport of resin, timber, katha and bamboos irrespective of magnitude of offence;
- ii) Cases of habitual offenders i.e. an offender who commits more than one offence during the year;
- iii) Illicit encroachment of forest land;
- iv) Where an individual/right holder/saw-miller is in possession of unaccounted timber, resin, katha for which satisfactory proof of procurement is not given by him;
- v) Where value of forest produce is more than rupees two lacs,
- vi) Illegal establishment of depot and illegal running of saw mills;
- vii) Deliberate causing of forest fire;
- viii) Illegal purchase and sale of timber;
- ix) Cases under Section 62 and 63 of the Indian Forest Act, 1927;
- x) Cases of shifting/uprooting/intentionally damaging the forest boundary pillars;
- xi) Defacing of hammer marks; and
- xii) Infringement on the stipulations imposed by Government of India while granting permission under Forest Conservation Act, 1980 and rules framed thereunder.

Cases which may be compounded:-

(1) Forest offences cases of right holders in the following circumstances can be compounded.

(a) Where illicit felling of trees has been done to meet the bonafide domestic requirements and the offence is petty in nature.

Note: - The expression 'petty' offences' in relation to illicit felling shall mean the offence where the aMoUnt involved in less than rupees two lakh. For determining that the offence is for bonafide domestic use, it must be established during investigation that timber has actually been used for domestic purpose only.

(b) No case of petty Forest offences involving illicit felling shall be compounded until an enquiry and investigation is hold by an officer not below the rank of Forest Ranger.

(c) Weak cases lacking in evidence and subsequently rendered un-fit for challan shall be compounded after examination by Divisional Forest Officer on advice of concerned District Attorney. Where there is difference of opinion between the Divisional Forest Officer and District Attorney, the Conservator of Forests thereon shall be final.

2) All forest offence cases relating to illicit lopping against the regulatory provisions/rules by right holders either for the purpose of fodder or fuel shall be compounded and taken to courts only if the accused refuses to compound the same.

3) Cases relating to illicit grazing shall be compounded and be taken to courts only if the offender refuses to compound.

4) No case of violation of provisions of H.P. Land Preservation Act, 1978 shall be compounded except, where no element of trade is involved and unauthorized felling of trees from private land is for bonafide domestic use and involves not more five trees than the limit specified under the Act *ibid*.

5) In all cases to be compounded under Indian Forest Act, 1927, in addition to the acceptance of compensation as per provisions of the said Act, the case property shall not be released after charging value thereof at the market rate.

6) In cases to be compounded under Himachal Pradesh Land Preservation Act, 1978 only compensation for the forest offence shall be charged and no value for release of property be charged.

7) In the under mentioned cases double rates shall be charged both for compensation and release of property

(i) Where offence is committed before sun rise or after sun set;

(ii) Where offence is committed in reserve forest,

- (iii) Where resistance is offered at the time of detection of offence;
 - (iv) Where compounding of offence is done with the permission of the Court where the matter is pending for adjudication,
 - (v) Unauthorized uprooting of stamps of all species, and
 - (vi) Offence committed in plantation or regeneration area.
- 8) Forest offences relating to unavoidable damages caused by the Companies or corporate Bodies shall be compounded after ascertaining by an officer not below the rank of Divisional Forest Officer, that the damage is unavoidable.
- 9) Forest offences relating to avoidable damages upto Rs. 2 lacs caused by the companies of Corporate Bodies shall be compounded after realizing value of the forest produce and compensation at the double rates.

Explanation: -1. 'Avoidable damage' means the damage which can be avoided by taking reasonable humanly or mechanical precaution.

2. 'Unavoidable damage' means the damage which cannot be avoided even by taking reasonable humanly or mechanical precaution.

3. Cases to be taken to Courts by the Forest Department:- The following cases shall be taken to courts by department and defended through District Attorneys:-

- i) Cases not liable to be compounded as detailed at para 1 of this notification;
- ii) Where offender refuses to compound the offence;
- iii) Where the value of produce involved is between rupees two lacs and rupees ten lacs; and
- iv) Cases of avoidable damages caused by the companies/Corporate Bodies involving aMoUnt more than Rs. 2 lacs and uptoRs. 10 lacs.

4. Cases to be registered with Police: - The following types of cases shall be registered with the police by the department, namely:-

- i) Forest offence cases where the value of produce is more than rupees ten lacs;
- ii) Cases relating to area where Indian Forest Act, 1927 and rules framed there under are not applicable or there are no special rules under which prosecution is possible.
- iii) Where Divisional Forest Officer concerned considers that police rather than Forest Department may deal with the matter to have deterrent effect. In all these cases, previous sanction of Conservator of Forests shall be obtained.

- iv) When encroachment is detected on forest land, action for removal of such encroachment shall be initiated under the Himachal Pradesh Public Premises and Land (Eviction and Rent Recovery) Act, 1971 and also action for committing forest offence by the encroacher shall be initiated under the Indian Forest Act, 1927. FIR under various provisions of Indian Penal Code shall be registered with Police in case:-
- (i) Boundary pillars have been tampered with;
 - (ii) Permanent structure has been made;
 - (iii) Area encroached is more than 10 bighas;
 - (iv) Offence of encroachment is committed repeatedly;
 - (v) There is encroachment within the protected area network (PAN) i.e. in a Wildlife Sanctuary or National Park.
 - (vi) The cases involving avoidable damages exceeding rupees 10 lacs caused by the Companies or Corporate Bodies.

1. The powers for fixing of rates of compensation, value of forest produce, implements and review of damage reports shall be as under:-

- i) The rates of compensation of forest offence including illegal/illicit muck dumping shall be fixed by the concerned Conservator of Forests of the Circle.
- ii) The value of forest produce will be determined at the market value as fixed by the Principal Chief Conservator of Forests every year. The value of minor forest produce shall be the market value prevalent at that time to be fixed by the Conservator of Forests.
- iii) The rates of implements involved in the offence and to be released on compounding of the offence shall be fixed by Conservator of Forests of the circle.
- iv) All the damage reports shall be dealt with and reviewed at the range level for compounding and prosecution on monthly basis and report in this respect shall be sent to the Divisional Forest Officer.

APPENDIX-X (ii)

FOREST OFFENCES

DEPARTMENT OF FOREST FARMING AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION, H.P.

No. 4/1980 Dated Shimla-1, the 26/3/1980

It has been observed that inspite of instructions issued from time to time, due to care is not taken regarding prompt and timely disposal of Forest Offence cases. So much so that the cases are not being challaned in the court of law within the prescribed time limit. With the result that the accused, even in serious forest offence cases involving property worth thousands of rupees, are being acquitted simply on the technical ground of limitation, which is not desirable.

2. Recently strictures have been passed in one such case by the Chief Judicial Magistrate, Kangra at Dharmshala against the Divisional Forest Officer and the matter was brought by him to the notice of the Government for taking disciplinary action against the Forest/ Officials.

3. In order to avoid any such recurrence in future, it is hereby laid down that the following procedure will be followed for disposal of the forest offence cases:-

- i) All FIRs of forest offence is issued by the Beat Guard may be sent to the Range Officer within a week of the FIR and should be immediately entered in the damage register maintained in the Range Office.
- ii) Range Officer will immediately scrutinize the damage report and will send the same to the concerned Block Officer after assessing the compensation for realizing the aMoUnt of compensation from the offender (s) .However in case of serious nature involving illicit felling more then 2 trees, the cases will be dealt with by the Range Officer himself rather than entrusting the same to the Block Officer.
- iii) It will be obligatory on the part of Block Officer and Range Officer to call the offender (s) and record their statement (s) in the presence of witness (s) when he /they is /are willing to compound the case(s) or not.

- iv) The compensation in all such cases must be realized within period of 3 months of the commission of offence(s). In case (s) the offender (s) is /are not willing compound the case (s) for which his/their statement (s) must be recorded. The case should then be challenged in the Court of Law after expiry of 3 months. However, all challans must be submitted by the Range Office to the Divisional Forest officer for accordingly sanction within four months of the commission of offence positively.
 - v) The Divisional Prosecutor will scrutinize the case and enter the same in the Divisional prosecution register before these are put up to DFO for his sanction. There after these cases will be challaned in the Court of Law under the signature of the D.F.O.
 - vi) The case must be delivered in the court before the expiry of 6 months period positively failing which the responsibility for delay will rest with the concerned Range officer and D.F.O (Whatsoever delay the prosecution of cases) that will be personally responsible to make good the loss of Government.
4. The public Prosecutors have been entrusted the job of prosecuting the forest offence cases. However, one senior Dy. Forest Ranger should assist the P.P in conducting the forest offence cases. He will also keep the DFO and concerned R.O's informed about the progress of the cases.

These instructions should be followed compulsorily.

PARTICIPATORY FOREST MANAGEMENT RULES – 2001

(Authoritative English text of this Department Notification No. Fts-II (B)15-10/87 Dated 23.8.2001 as required under clause (3) of article 348 of the Constitution of India)

NOTIFICATION

No. Fts. II (B) 15- 10/87

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 80 read with section 81 of the Indian Forest Act, 1927 (Act No. XVI of 1927), the Governor, Himachal Pradesh is pleased to make the following Regulations, namely:

1. Short title, application and commencement:

- (1) These Regulations may be called the Himachal Pradesh Participatory Forest Management Regulations, 2001.
- (2) They shall apply to such Government forests and such Government land including the common land, which shall be selected jointly for participatory forest management by the Society and the Department.
- (3) They shall come into force from the date of publication in Rajpatra, Himachal Pradesh.

2. Definitions:

In these Regulations, unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context, -

- (a) “**Act**” means The Indian Forest Act, 1927, (Act No. 16 of 1927) as amended in its application to Himachal Pradesh;
- (b) “**Conflict Resolution Group**” means a group consisting of a representative of the concerned Gram Panchayat, a representative of the local non-government organizations or local community based organizations and the concerned Assistant Conservator of Forests;
- (c) “**common land**”, “**family**”, “**Gram Panchayat**”, “**Panch**”, “**Pradhan**”, “**village**” and “**Ward**” shall have the meanings respectively assigned to

them in the Himachal Pradesh Panchayati Raj Act, 1994 (Act No. 4 of 1994);

- (d) **"Department"** means the Himachal Pradesh Forest Department;
- (e) **"Divisional Forest Officer"** means the forest officer in-charge of a territorial or wildlife forest division of the Department;
- (f) **"Executive Committee"** means executive body of the Society;
- (g) **"Forest Officer"** means a Forest Officer as defined under sub- section (2) of section 2 of the Act;
- (h) **"General House"** means General House of the Society;
- (i) **"Government"** means Government of Himachal Pradesh;
- (j) **"Grazier group"** means a group of persons, whether resident members or migratory graziers, who are dependent on the grazing resource in the selected area for meeting their livelihood needs;
- (k) **"Micro-plan"**, means a holistic forest management and development plan of the area selected for participatory management;
- (l) **"Participatory forest management"** means management of Government forest and Government land including common land managed jointly by the Society and by the Department;
- (m) **"Selected area"** means any Government forest and Government land including common land selected under regulation 3 of these Regulations;
- (n) **"Self help group"** means any organized group of persons, who collectively by mutual help are able to enhance their economic status through resource based activities;
- (o) **"Site specific plan"** means a sub component of the micro-plan which is a technically appropriate plan for the site;
- (p) **"Society"** means village forest development society registered under section 3 of the Societies Registration Act, 1860 (Act No. 21 of 1860) for participatory forest management;
- (q) **"Sustainable forest management"** means management which is economically viable, environmentally benign and socially beneficial, and which balances present and future needs; and
- (r) **"User group"** means a group of persons dependent upon a common natural resource for sustaining its livelihood needs.

3. Intent of participatory forest management:

- (1) On an application made to the Divisional Forest Officer signed by at least 50 percent of the voters of a Gram Panchayat Ward, any Government

forest and Government land including common land may be brought under participatory forest management. The land so identified shall be known as selected area.

- (2) In accordance with the wider objectives and plans of Government for sustainable forest management, the selected area shall be managed jointly by the Society and the Department on the terms and conditions of an agreement to be entered between the Society and the Department.

4. Village forest development society:

- (1) There shall be a Society for a Gram Panchayat Ward. However, where the Ward is not compact and the hamlets within it do not have common forests, common grazing lands, common rights and concessions more than one Society may be formed for each cluster of hamlets. The Society shall be registered under section 3 of the Societies' Registration Act, 1860. (Act No. 21 of 1860).
- (2) All voters of a Gram Panchayat Ward shall be entitled to be enrolled as members of the Society.

5. Constitution of Executive Committee of the Society:

The Executive Committee shall consist of -

- a) President to be elected by the General House;
- b) Vice President -do-
- c) Four Members -do-
- d) Treasurer to be nominated by the elected members from amongst the members of the Society;
- e) Joint Secretary (woman) -do-
- f) Ward Panch ex-officio member;
- g) President - Mahila Mandal -do-
- h) Representative - Local women group -do-
- i) Three Members to be co-opted from the village level committees constituted by other departments of the Government, societies registered under the Societies Registration Act, 1860, (Act No. 21 of 1860) , user groups, self help group and grazier group;
- j) Member- Secretary to be elected by the General House. Provided that at least 7 members of the Executive Committee shall be from amongst the women. Joint Secretary shall assist the Member-Secretary.

6. Term of office of members of the Executive Committee:

Elected members of the Executive Committee shall hold office for a period of two years from the date of assumption of office.

7. Powers of the Executive Committee:

The Executive Committee shall exercise the powers of a “Forest Officer” as assigned by the Government under the Act.

8. Usufruct Sharing:

The Society shall be entitled to the following benefits, namely :-

- a) to collect the yield such as fallen twigs, branches, loppings, grass, fruits, flowers, seeds, leaf fodder and non timber forest products free of cost;
- b) to the sale proceeds of all intermediate harvest, subject to protection of forest and plantations for at least 3 years from the date of agreement;
- c) to organize and promote vocational activities related to forest produce and land; and other activities such as promotion of self help groups which may provide direct benefits, including micro-lending to women. None of the activities so promoted shall affect the legal status of the forest land;
- d) recorded rights over the forest shall not be affected by these benefits;
- e) the Government shall charge no royalty on the forest produce within the selected area;
- f) after 5 years, the Society may expand the area, on the basis of a fresh agreement deed, by inclusion of adjoining or nearby areas;
- g) after 20years from the date of agreement and, based on the principles of sustained forest management, 75 percent of the net sale proceeds from the selected area shall be put into the account of Society and the remaining 25 percent of the net sale proceeds shall go to the concerned Gram Panchayat; and
- h) To utilize at least 40 percent of the net sale proceeds on forest regeneration activities including soil and water conservation provided that for the purpose of usufruct sharing, family shall be one unit.

9. Funds:

Funds shall be generated by the Society through contributions by members and the sale of usufructs under these regulations. All funds, including those received from the Government, Gram Panchayats and non-government sources shall be utilized through the micro-planning process.

- 10. Maintenance of Accounts:** The sum received by the Society shall be deposited in the name of the concerned Society in a nationalized bank or scheduled bank or co-operative bank or post office and the account shall be operated under the signatures of the President, Treasurer and Member-Secretary of the Society.
- 11. Grant-in-Aid:** The department shall release Grant-In- Aid to the Society under the Grant-In-Aid Rules subject to the availability of funds and satisfactory performance of functions by the Society.
- 12. Settlement of Dispute:** In case of any dispute in relation to usufruct sharing in the Society, the Deputy Ranger concerned of the Department, shall take steps to reconcile the dispute. In case the dispute is not resolved, the Deputy Ranger shall refer the dispute, along with his report to the Range Officer concerned of the Department. The Range Officer, after hearing the parties, shall resolve the dispute within 30 days from the date of receipt of report of the Deputy Ranger.
- 13. Appeal:** An appeal shall lie from the decision of the Range Officer to the Conflict Resolution Group to be filed within 30 days from the date of decision, who shall decide the same within 60 days from the date of filing of appeal, after affording an opportunity of being heard to the parties. The decision of the Conflict Resolution Group shall be final and binding on the parties. The Conflict Resolution Group shall send a copy of the decision to the Society and the Divisional Forest Officer concerned free of cost.
- 14. Preparation of micro-plans:**

 - (1) A micro-plan shall be prepared for the holistic forest management and development of the selected area, by the Society. The Department shall help the Society in preparation of the micro-plan. A micro-plan shall be operative for a period of five years from the date of its approval by the Divisional Forest Officer and may be revised after three years. The micro-plan shall be passed in the general house with at least 60 percent majority of the members present.
 - (2) The Divisional Forest Officer may approve whole or part of the micro-plan.
- 14. Powers of the Government:** Notwithstanding anything contained in these regulations, the Government shall have the powers to issue directions to the

Society on participatory forest management processes, micro-planning, co-ordination, monitoring, and grant -in -aid and implementation mechanisms.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE_____JFMC (JOINT FOREST MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE) AND FDA (FOREST DEVELOPMENT AGENCY SHIMLA)

The agreement between Joint Forest Management Committee _____(JFMC) duly registered with CF Shimla-cum-Chairperson Forest Development Agency Shimla and Forest Development Agency (FDA) Shimla which is a duly registered body under Section 3 of Societies Registration Act 1860(Act no. 21 of 1860).

This Memorandum of Agreement (Mo A) containing the following terms and conditions is hereby signed between the JFMC_____ through its President (1st Party and the FDA Shimla through its Member Secretary i.e. DFO Shimla (2nd Party).

General Agreement:

1. This agreement is done with respect to the area proposed for treatment as per Micro plan of the JFMC _____.
2. Provisions of the guidelines of NAP (National Afforestation Programme) and HP PFM Regulations, 2001 notified vide no. Fts.II (B) 15-110/87 date 23.8.2001 shall be binding on the JFMC and FDA Shimla.
3. Terms used in this Mo A shall have the same meaning as given in the guidelines of NAP (National Afforestation Programme) and the HP PFM Regulations, 2001.
4. Roles and responsibilities as given here under for the JFMC and FDA are acceptable to both the parties.
5. The legal status of land brought under this agreement shall remain unchanged and continue to be the same as it was prior to signing of this Mo A.
6. The implementation and financial assistance shall be governed as per approved Project Document and as modified from time to time.

Roles And Responsibility Of First Party

1. Copy of byelaws and registration certificate of JFMC_____ are annexed herewith and shall be a part of this MoA.
2. After the parties jointly reach a conclusion about treatment of selected area/areas, the JFMC shall prepare a detailed Micro plan for approval of Member Secretary FDA Shimla-cum-DFO Shimla.

3. The JFMC shall develop necessary mechanism for and shall implement approved micro plan satisfactorily involving a monitoring committee that will include the Ward Panch.
4. The JFMC shall convene regular meetings (at least once every three months), keep record and maintain account in accordance with its bye-laws and provisions of Societies Act 1860.
5. The account of JFMC shall be audited according to instructions of Government of India or by a qualified Chartered Accountant. The JFMC shall submit a copy of the audited account and its annual report to the concerned Member Secretary-cum-DFO Shimla.
6. The JFMC shall make the records available to the officers of the Forest Department on demand.
7. The JFMC shall work out a mechanism for equitable sharing of usufructs and sale proceeds of harvest from the selected area amongst its members.
8. The JFMC undertakes to protect the selected area and adjoining forests against fire, grazing encroachments poaching illicit removal and damage to forests/forest boundary, take cognizance of such offences and report the same to the concerned forest officer. The JFMC is responsible for the standing trees already existing in the selected areas handed over to them.
9. The JFMC shall render assistance in implementation of all the Forest Laws and Acts including Wild Life Protection Act, 1972 in the areas falling within its area of work.
10. The JFMC shall raise funds for implementation of the approved Micro plan on its own and this MoA shall in no way bind the FDA for providing funds to the JFMC for any or all activities proposed under the Micro plan.
11. The JFMC will open an account in any Nationalized/Cooperative Bank to be operated by President/Member Secretary jointly.
12. The JFMC shall submit Utilization Certificate for the funds utilized by the Committee for each quarter to The DFO Shimla-cum-Member Secretary FDA Shimla.

Role and Responsibilities of the Second Party

1. The DFO Shimla-cum-Member Secretary FDA Shimla shall release the funds after approval of the Micro plan in the first instance and subsequently as and when received from Government of India.
2. The DFO Shimla-cum-Member Secretary FDA Shimla shall approve the micro plan submitted by JFMC in relation to selected area as it is or with

modifications keeping in view ecological requirement of the area, within 30 days of its submission.

3. The Micro plan has to be for a minimum period of 5 years but it may be reviewed/ modified after 3 years.
4. The DFO Shimla-cum-Member Secretary FDA Shimla shall provide or arrange necessary training(s) to the Member secretary and other members of the JFMC as per requirement.
5. The DFO Shimla-cum-Member Secretary FDA Shimla or his representative Forest Department may check implementation of approved Micro plan activities to ensure proper utilization of GIA.
6. The details of assets created by the first party will be incorporated by the second party in the Working Plan document and concerned Compartment History File.
7. If JFMC fails to execute the works or does not work properly or does not maintain accounts etc. properly Member Secretary FDA Shimla can appoint Administrator to run the affairs of the JFMC.

Settlement of disputes

In case of any dispute between the parties regarding this MoA, it will be resolved by the Conflict Resolution Group; the decision of Chairperson FDA Shimla-cum-CF Shimla shall be final and will be binding on all parties.

APPENDIX-XV

MONKEY INCIDENCE ESTIMATION

Objectives: The monkey count in towns/rural areas with high monkey incidence will answer the following questions

- A. Which town/rural areas are having high monkey incidences (such areas are being called as monkey hot spots) within the state?
- B. Over period of time whether the monkey incidence is rising or decreasing in the hot spots?
- C. This attempt is not to count all the monkeys in the state.

Methods: A two-step strategy will be implemented for an efficient monkey incidence estimation of the state of Himachal. This would include.

1. Preliminary Observations for Monkey Estimation to determine the hot spots,
2. Comprehensive Monkey Estimation in the hot spots.

Instructions for the Field Staff

- i. Every DFO in field (Territorial or Wildlife) is the leader of the Monkey Incidence Estimation.
- ii. Step 1, Preliminary Observations for Monkey Estimation (see Form 1) will be executed in all the forest beats of the state (except Lahul and Spiti where monkeys are not found) to ascertain presence/absence of monkeys.
- iii. In every beat, the forest guard will take cooperation of Notified Area Committee, Panchayats, NGOs, Yuvak or Mahila Mandals to undertake both steps i.e. Preliminary Observations and Comprehensive Monkey Estimation.
- iv. **All over HP, the Preliminary Observations will be done in three days time; thereafter, the Comprehensive Monkey Estimation will take only half-an-hour on the same date between 8 and 8.30 AM.**
- v. One observer can cover a distance of two to three km in half-an-hour between 8 and 8.30 AM. The DFOs will ensure deployment of staff, Panchayat representatives, NGOs and others accordingly. All the observers should know their field positions in at least one day advance so that they are well acquainted with the place or hot spots where they have to count monkeys.

- vi. The beat Guard will be the compiler of the data provided by the observers in his/her beat. Likewise, beat data will be compiled at Range and Division level to further send it to Circle and then to the CCF (FD and PAN) at Shimla.
- vii. DFOs and their ACFs will be in-charge of training of Forest Guards, representatives of Panchayats, NGOs, Yuvak or Mahila Mandals. The training will be conducted at each Division HQ level or any other suitable place to ensure participation of all concerned.
- viii. The Preliminary Observations for Monkey Estimation is seen as an opportunity to bring together the Forest Officials, and Resource Persons such as NGOs, community to respond to the man-primate conflicts.
- ix. Step 2, Comprehensive monkey estimation is the main part of this exercise which will be taken up immediately after the preliminary observations or survey is completed.
- x. The concerned DFOs will facilitate making of sufficient copies of Form 1 and 2 for participating teams in the Monkey estimation.
- xi. The monkey estimation will be biannual feature to be conducted during the month of January/February and August/September, every year.

Step 1: Preliminary Observations for Monkey Estimation to determine Hot Spots (see Form 1)

This forms the primary step of incidence estimation exercise. It necessarily would involve all the forest/wildlife beats of the state. The data will be collected and compiled in the Form No. 1 given as annexure. This form will be filled-up in the field based on monkey troop's observations in association with concerned NGOs, and the local people etc. This data collected will form the background to identify the areas of high incidence abundance or hot spots as well as those exhibiting large scale conflicts. All the observations of monkey-infested areas or hot spots will be marked on the maps at the forest beat, forest range and Forest Division levels.

Step2: Comprehensive Monkey Estimations.

Based on the preliminary observations, the Monkey Incidence Estimation will be done. In general this Estimation would be carried out in the selected high man-monkey conflict areas (hot spots) obtained from the Preliminary Observations for Monkey Estimation. The aim of this exercise would be to impart training to the concerned personnel, NGOs, community for conducting comprehensive monkey estimation. In general the feedback of this exercise

would form a basis for further improvement in methodology and refining of technique of incidence estimation. A data collection sheet given as Form 2 in the annexure will be filled up by all the concerned forest personnel, NGOs, community. The Form 2 will be compiled at the Division level. Simultaneous data plotting on the beat map will be carried out.

The above mentioned two steps will be biannual feature to be conducted during the month of January/February and August/September for the reasons that during months of August/September the parturition of females is nearly over and it will give a better demographic estimation in subsequent surveys. During the month of January/February, the feed availability is low and due to better visibility, better estimation of incidence can be carried out.

The compiled data from this exercise can be used for studying the impact of various conflict resolving methods, like sterilisation, garbage management etc., study of migratory pattern of monkeys, social behaviour of monkeys, group reorganizational behaviour, post-sterilisation behaviour, resolution of man-animal conflict (including crop damage study, direct bite cases etc.), and demographic trends etc.

Methods for Comprehensive Monkey Estimation in the Hot Spots **(see Form 2)**

1. Set up a sufficiently large pilot study in an area, such as a town, a temple complex and surround, or a highway where monkeys are seen regularly. In towns like Shimla, Bilaspur, Hamirpur, Dharamshala, Nahan, Solan, or Mandi it may be very difficult to identify a few vantage points. On the clear trails (such as streets or roads), observers will walk in a given timeframe (20 to 30 minutes) to note the numbers of the monkeys, their location, group size, composition, direction of movement, etc. Care must be taken that the spread of the 'transects' is such that a large area of the town is covered, but there are clear blind areas that separate different 'transects', so that chances of double counts are almost excluded. One observer will cover two to three km area in half-an-hour. **A good time to walk on these designated transects is 8 AM anywhere in the state of HP where monkeys are abundantly found. The estimation on the transect will be completed by 8.30 AM.**

2. Initially we need to identify different segments in the Core Area (where the monkeys are found in abundance). In these transects or segments, various vantage points will be identified to closely observe the monkeys without interference. If a particular segment is quite big this may be further sub-segmented under a person/forest guard/observer to observe the monkeys from a vantage observation point, in the morning at 8 AM when monkeys come out to forage. This should be ensured that monkey in line-of-sight of the observer are counted and there is no repetition of count of the same monkeys by the other observers.
3. Location and identification of these observation points should be noted/plotted on a map of the area with number of monkey recorded. Data Sheets will be prepared on the Form 2 given as Appendix. Information regarding age and sex of the monkeys, and food provisioning and garbage disposal at surveyed sites need to be kept.
4. The survey/incidence estimation is to be conducted in such a manner that all the monkeys in every **observer's domain are counted in a period of half an hour (between 8 AM and 8.30 AM)** This may be enhanced to one hour depending on size of the segment. The period of counting is kept 30 minutes (between 8 and 8.30 AM) so that the level of error of number is avoided due to migration of the animals from one observation point to another.
5. The monkey survey is to be conducted by involving various NGOs, professionals and other similar institutions involved with monkeys. Perhaps involvement of Eco-clubs, schools/colleges in the vicinity of identified locations will be also a most desirable component
6. The whole exercise is to be repeated during winter (January/February) and August/September to know variation and error if any.
7. Once the results are obtained, the methodology may be improved and then approved to be replicated in different areas of the state to arrive at a figure of incidence of monkeys.
8. A basic website/blog will be created to have an online access to the information to a wide user/stakeholder groups
9. The lessons from this exercise will be integrated with the standard wild life incidence estimations of the Wildlife Wing of HPFD.

Notes:

- a) Observer's/Forest or Wildlife Guard's familiarity with the terrain and monkeys is the basic assumption/premise of this exercise.

- b) The DFOs will help specify the area to be surveyed by the field staff. The area with monkeys should be demarcated on the map. It can be rectangular or square strip. For forest/rural incidence it should be larger (approximately 10-15 sq km), whereas for the urban incidence it may be smaller (about 4 sq km). The reason being that forest monkeys live in larger home ranges and the urban monkeys have smaller home ranges.
- c) The Important thing is to identify the group; while counting two things need to be avoided; (a) no repeated count of the same monkey; (b) as far as possible no monkey is left out from counting. In this process even if it takes longer time to count, it does not add error in the counting.
- d) There are chances of error when we do repeated counts, even the observer may miss the entire group on a particular day. If it is enforced, there are chances of fictitious counts. This exercise is primarily for monitoring the monkey incidences. Thus it may be more informative if counts are made at longer intervals, for example three or four times in a year. That may show certain trends in mortality and natality.
- e) There will be a SPECIAL mention of such areas which are part of monkey incidence estimation; where monkeys have been released after their sterilization.
- f) Those who are well conversant with the Google Earth Images may use them for this purpose.
- g) In order to make the monkey incidence estimation a long term plan, Open source mapping GIS software can and should be used. There is no cost in acquiring the software plus a large number of people can share the same tools and do some good monitoring which is transparent accessible and verifiable.

(Amendment) Act, 2001- clarification thereof.

Sir

I am directed to say that the H.P Village Common Lands vesting and Utilization (Amendment) Act,2001 (Act No.20 of 2001) has been Published in the Rajpatra (extra ordinary) dated 1st October,2001, a copy of which is sent herewith for information and taking necessary action at your end.

In this regard, I am directed to clarify that in sub-section 3 of the amendment Act the word “cultivation” has not been defined in the Act the word “cultivating possession” should be understood in its natural meaning of the word “cultivation” has not been defined in the Act. The plants which have perennial roots trees, shrubs and grass are included in crop. If one raises such crop he naturally cultivates the land for the specified purpose. In Corpor Juris Secundum, Volume 25, the purposes of cultivation have been explained. In the present tense “cultivate” has been defined as to improve the product of the earth by manual industry; management and improvement in husbandry; to till, or husband the ground to forward the product of the earth, by general industry; to till, prepare for crops, manure, plough, dress and sow and reap. The cultivation will include good management and care, and usually, but not always implies the

planting of annual crops. “The harvesting of such crops as perennial grass has also been held to be cultivation of land. If one adopted any physical process even to safe guard such crop he would be held to be cultivating it. If he proves that he has fenced the ground, has watered the grass has protected it from the animals he could have been stated to be in cultivating possession of the same. The intention of the Government is that all the land which is recorded as “Shamlat tika Hasab Rasad Malguzari” or by any such other name in the ownership column of Jamabandi and assessed to land revenue should be restored to the right-holders up to their share except the land which has been allotted or utilized by the State Government after the enforcement of the Village Common Lands Vesting and Utilization Act, 1974.

You are, therefore requested to take immediate necessary action as per above clarification keeping in view that the land which has already been put to use by the Government should not be disturbed. The land will be mutated back to the Shamlat Hasab Rasad Zare Khewat and Malguzari or whatever term might have been used for owned shamlat accordingly.

The progress report regarding compliance of the same may kindly be sent monthly and acknowledge the receipt of this letter also.
